Objective (s)	 Children to play with books, utilizing ICT tools. To delve into a specific book and identify with its characters. Children to interact within reading communities, discussing book- and reading-related issues.

Setting, materials, and preparation	 Place: Classroom or Computer Lab Materials: PC, printer, Microsoft Publisher 	
Step -by-step description	 Children write, revise, design, and print their own newspaper, using and inventing news from a book they have read. After reading and discussing a book, children bring to class old newspapers in order to study their different pages and texts published in their diverse sections. Each student or group produces one text, page or section for this special newspaper issue. 	
	 4. Some examples of sections for the newspaper are: front-page (the most important news, contents, advertising of the next issue) page with local news (e.g. for "Little Red Riding hood": news from the forest) international news (e.g. news from the town) 	







	 sport news (e.g. report on a race between Red Riding hood and the Wolf) the arts (e.g. article on an art exhibition by Granny and the Wolf) financial news adds social news scientific issues weather report readers' letters Children may scan images from the book and use them in the newspaper or create their own pictures. Each group creates a piece of the newspaper in Publisher. Delegates from each group collaborate with the teacher and put together the issue. The newspaper may be presented and/or distributed to all classes. Printed issues are placed in the class and school library, perhaps next to the book they are related to.
Notes to reading promotion facilitator	It's important that children interact with students and staff outside their class.
Suggested follow-up actions/ activities	 NEWSCAST: In a similar manner, students may produce a news broadcast based on characters and events in the book (Wilhelm, 1997). Children could utilize the newspaper as a form of imaginative book report. Issues of the newspaper could be sent to parents and placed in the school's reception area.
